After completing training I joined my regiment "Scotlands own" 4th Royal Tank Regiment in Germany. I was working one day on my tank when 2 guys wearing tartan trews (*Editor's Note: trews = Scottishs pants*) turned up and informed me that the Pipe Major wanted to see me. I went to see him and the Band President and was asked if I could help out playing, as they had most of the drummers back in the UK on training and there was a big show being put together in the town where we were stationed.

I agreed to help out and was sent to get my uniform from the tailor shop. The show was a success and I duly returned to the tailor on Monday morning only to be told that the Commanding Officer had transferred me to the P's & D's!!

As much I was not wanting anything to do with being in the band, I must admit it was the start of a great career. I got to play all over the world, in places like Denmark, Sweden, Germany, USA, Canada, Italy, Belgium, France, Venezuela South America, Cyprus, Russia and of course then the Edinburgh tattoo in Scotland a few times. It must have been fate that I come all the way to Ellsworth, Maine and find a Pipe band! This duly rekindled the spark and I returned to playing as lead drummer with the Maine Saint Andrews Pipes and Drums and also as their Drum Major. It is now an honour and a privilege to be Drum Major for the Saint Andrews Society of Maine at their Highland Games for the last 3 years and hopefully do so for as long as they would want me to. As a Scot, I am proud that there are so many people who keep the traditions of their clans going, and I feel at home when I am amongst all the Tartan even though it is just for a day.




